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
Inheritance Games Book Review

King Charles III coronation

The coronation of King Charles III marks a significant chapter in UK history.

The King's Coronation was the coronation of King Charles III and his wife Camilla which declared them King and Queen of the United Kingdom and other Commonwealth realms. This historic event was held on the Saturday 6th May and took place in Westminster Abbey – the same place his mother was crowned Queen. The last coronation was almost 70 years ago, so for a lot of us, this is the first coronation we have experienced and celebrated. The coronation will reflect the monarch's role today and look towards our bright future, while being rooted in long-established traditions, rituals and pageantry. It is a huge step in our history books, and we look forward to what our new leaders will accomplish in their time on the throne.

Dating back to the Anglo-Saxon times, we have been having a coronation for over 1,000 years. The first documented coronation was that of William the Conqueror on 25th December 1066. Even then we read of grand thrones, resplendent crowns and rows and rows of people dressed in extravagant robes. We see the priest blessing the newly crowned king and we see candles being lit in honor of the new monarchy. It seems that tradition still stands strong since the coronation of King Charles III wasn't much different. Charles walked down the aisle to his throne adorned in historic, priest-like, velvet robes that dates back centuries. He was bathed in gold, from the flowing robes to the crown delicately placed atop his head which symbolises his royalty. This crown is named the St Edward's Crown and it is the centerpiece of the Crown Jewels of the United Kingdom. This infamous crown was named after Saint Edward the Confessor, and it is tradition for English and British Monarchs to be crowned with this. The grand hall was packed with a plethora of people, from the young choir to much of the royal family and of course King Charles and Camilla. The choirs' voices made a melody that drifted down the halls filling every corner with their angelic voices. Several celebrities also made an appearance, including Ant and Dec, Katy Perry and Lionel Richie and Emma Thompson. This proves the significance of this event and the importance of it throughout the community. As tradition, most of the royal family were there, including Prince William and Catherine, Prince Harry, Prince Andrew and Princess Anne. They wore elaborate gowns and velvet cloaks, signifying their membership of historic orders and eminence.

The day started off with the grand arrival at Westminster Abbey. Thousands and thousands welcomed King Charles III and Queen Consort Camilla to Buckingham palace. Royals waved from the windows of their Rolls Royce as it cruised from Clarence House through the Palace gates. The cameras then showcased Charles standing beside the coronation chair. Trumpets and shouts of our national anthem, "God Save the King" completed the next stage of this service. The King then swore an oath, declaring to uphold the law and the Church of England. The next stage is called "The anointing". This is where the King would be concealed from view by a canopy of cloth and the archbishop would anoint the Kings hand and head with a secret recipe (reportedly including jasmine, cinnamon and roses.) From that point, the King would then be gifted with items such as the Royal Orb – representing religious and moral authority - and the Sovereign's Sceptre, a golden rod topped with a peaceful white enameled dove, a symbol of justice. This particular bit is evocative of when his mother, Queen Elizabeth III, was crowned and we recognise this stage as one that will forever be remembered. The final part would include peers kneeling before the King and the Queen Consort to pay homage to them. After all these traditions, the King would be formally declared as the King of the United Kingdom and other commonwealth realms.

We will forever recognise this grandeur as one of the few traditions that still poses strong after all these years – the traditions and rituals bringing us all together to witness this new era. As we celebrate this new chapter in our history books, we are left eager and intrigued towards our future with a different leader on the throne.

Eid Mubarak

The biggest holiday in the Islamic calendar

To mark the end of Ramadan, on April 21st this year Muslims from all over the world celebrated Eid al-Fitr -which means 'the festival of breaking fast'. After a month of fasting from dawn to sunset, Muslims join friends, family or even strangers to share feasts, pray and celebrate this euphoric religious occasion. Ramadan is a month in the Islamic lunar calendar and, by fasting, allows Muslims to devote themselves to their faith and Allah (God) and it allows them to empathize with the less fortunate. Eid begins with the first sighting of the new crescent moon in the sky, so the date of the event varies each year but what never changes is the amount of exuberance and love that is shared.

With their being approximately 2 billion Muslims across the globe, it's not a surprise that there are many variations as to how people celebrate, but I spoke to a Muslim in our very own school to see how she commemorates this sacred ceremony. "The day before Eid we usually clean the entire house and put on henna." Henna symbolises good health, protection and spiritual enlightenment and is mainly used in the special occasions in which there is a joyous gathering of people. "We start the day off with a special Eid prayer early in the morning and then get dressed into our new Eid clothes and eat breakfast. Later, we meet with family and friends and have lots of sweets and snacks. For our meals I usually have tandoori chicken with rice and salad. My family also usually give money to charity the day before or of Eid."

During this holiday, you will often hear Muslims greeting each other by saying "Eid Mubarak" meaning "Blessed Eid" and "taqabbala allahu minna wa minkum" or "may God accept your deeds". Eid al-Fitr is a time to reflect on the month that has passed, to be proud of achieving a month of fasting and to hope that the deeds have earned the pleasure of the Lord.

However, later on in the year - this year it will take place in or around June - another Eid takes place: Eid al-Adha (Festival of sacrifice). This festival remembers the prophet Ibrahim's willingness to sacrifice his son when Allah ordered him to. Eid al-Adha is the second major Muslim holiday and as well as representing Ibrahim's devotion to Allah, the holy event also marks the end of Hajj. Hajj is a five-day pilgrimage that all Muslims - if able to - should carry out at least once in their life. The festivities of this day include sacrificing an animal and sharing it amongst family, friends and the poor. Even though both Eid's are major religious holidays for billions of people, many of us don't actually know much about the significance of them and the traditions that they bear.

A Muslim in our school had this to say about the subject, "I think most people acknowledge the occasion but don't know a lot about it. For example, the different dishes and sweet treats we eat are unique and peculiar to others so they have little knowledge about them. Also, - depending on where you're from - our clothes would be different to what you would normally expect someone to wear. Overall, I think it is acknowledged but people should educate themselves a little more and try to recognise it more."
